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the hidden crisis of missing and murdered indigenous women and girls in canada is both a national tragedy and a national shame in this ground breaking new volume as part of their larger efforts to draw attention to the shockingly high rates of violence against our sisters jennifer brant and d memee lavell harvard have pulled together a variety of voices from the academic realms to the grassroots and front lines to speak on what has been identified by both the inter american commission on human rights and the united nations as a grave violation of the basic human rights of aboriginal women and girls linking colonial practices with genocide through their exploration of the

current statistics root causes and structural components of the issue including conversations on policing media and education the contributing authors illustrate the resilience strength courage and spirit of indigenous women and girls as they struggle to survive in a society shaped by racism and sexism patriarchy and misogyny this book was created to honour our missing sisters their families their lives and their stories with the hope that it will offer lessons to non indigenous allies and supporters so that we can all work together towards a nation that supports and promotes the safety and well being of all first nation métis and inuit women and girls

the renowned nahna james has written a five series poetry collection titled my favourite poems poetry from the pen of a nigerian teenager this is his debut collection of poetry and prose it contains poems and essays on topics such as nigeria love real feelings sexuality grief nudism bisexuality loss melancholy loneliness healing marginalisation self love unconditional love the power of letting go and the wisdom that develops when we make an effort to understand ourselves many readers have referred to his writing as life changing healing and part of their every day ritual this book is a lovely reminder of the celebration of hope an encounter with grace a mending of the heart a healing of scars and a hymn of liberation that one can always choose to transform themselves it s just up to you to make a decision

in this fiction story a young girl lives in small town with a regular job friends yet somehow in another world in the end she finds herself in the last place she would imagine

a comprehensive corpus analysis of adolescent health communication is long overdue and this book provides it we know comparatively little about the language adolescents use to articulate their health concerns and discourse analysis of their choices can shed light on their attitudes towards and beliefs about health and illness this book interrogates a two million word corpus of messages posted by adolescents to an online health forum it adopts a mixed method corpus approach to health communication combining both quantitative and qualitative techniques analysis in this way gives voice to an age group whose subjective experiences of illness have often been marginalized or simply overlooked in favour of the concerns of older populations

numerous publications on african literature include women literature and development in africa and she is also author of a collection of short stories broken lives and other stories and a novel in progress

in her new book jane katch explores the painful problems of bullying teasing and exclusion why she wonders does a young child just becoming aware of the existence of the group feel such a strong need to keep another child out and is it possible to teach children to create social groups that aren't defined by excluding others with her acute eye and deft pen katch watches her class of four and five year olds begin to form exclusionary groups and tells us what happens as she tries to intervene her classroom has a rule based on vivian paley's work you can't say you can't play it works well until a new child joins the class zoe braids flying behind her insists on having things her way and wants the other children's games to conform to her wishes she's scared of roaring she kicks and she's terrified of losing her tenuous place in the group she's also a wildly wonderfully imaginative child but the rule of fairness is not by itself enough to address the dynamics of this classroom zoe's endless troublemaking sends katch on a quest to better understand why some kids exclude others talking with her brother who teased her as a child with high school kids and as always with her class katch comes to new understandings of why some kids bully and scapegoat how other kids get through the experience and how she as a teacher might intervene they don't like me is at once a fascinating absorbing look into the social lives of children and a book for teachers and parents who are trying to understand how to prevent exclusion and how to support children who are being teased and bullied

recording the opinions of childless women from all over the world and letting this growing band answer their detractors this investigation looks into the world of those who choose not to have children interviewees speak freely and honestly about their experiences providing readers with both the many reasons people choose to live child free and insight into what seems to them an unhealthy amount of societal pressure to become mothers and fathers this book also presents interviews with parents who wish they had not had children while offering their reasons for feeling regret concluding with a look into the workplace this title evaluates the fairness of allowing parents shorter days and time off to accommodate children compared to the working environment of those who have chosen to live without children

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
